

The Metro Tunnel is the biggest upgrade of Melbourne's train network since the City Loop opened in 1981.

The Metro Tunnel includes new rail tunnels under Melbourne's CBD, stopping at five new underground train stations.

It will mean all Victorians will benefit from new train connections to key destinations, including:

- The Royal Melbourne Hospital, Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre and the University of Melbourne via Parkville Station.
- St Kilda Road near the Shrine of Remembrance, Royal Botanic Gardens, and Albert Park, via Anzac Station.



Bendigo and Echuca Line Upgrade

The Bendigo and Echuca Line Upgrade, completed in 2022, included three new stations and enabled faster and more frequent services between Bendigo and Echuca.

Improvements for Bendigo, Echuca and Swan Hill line passengers in the past decade have included:



66 new weekly services, helping passengers reach their destinations sooner.



10 level crossings upgraded for more reliable services.



Three new stations at Goornong, Huntly, and Raywood.



Track upgrades between Epsom and Echuca to cut travel times.



New bus interchange at Bendigo Station for better connections.



2,400 regional train services delivered each week. That's a **55% increase** since 2015.



Regional fares capped, saving passengers over \$40 on return long-distance V/Line journeys.

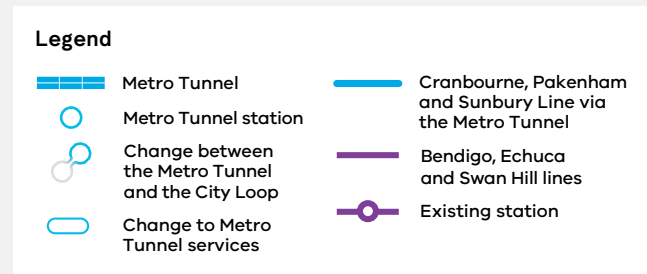

Five new stations

The Metro Tunnel's five stations will be new architectural landmarks for Victoria.

The stations include shops and cafes, wide platforms and Victorian-first platform screen doors.

State Library and Town Hall stations are connected to Melbourne Central and Flinders Street stations to make it easy to switch between Metro Tunnel and City Loop services.

Better connections

+ Better access to health services

The Metro Tunnel will transform travel for hospital staff, patients and visitors, with the new Parkville Station on the doorstep of The Royal Melbourne and The Royal Women's hospitals and Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre.

🎓 Better access to education

The Metro Tunnel will provide better connections for students and staff across Victoria to Melbourne's universities, TAFEs and schools, including direct rail access to the University of Melbourne for the first time in its 170-year history.

💼 Better access to jobs

The Metro Tunnel will help passengers who travel to Melbourne for work by opening up new destinations in the city.

That includes Parkville's hospitals, the St Kilda Road business hub and the Arden precinct — a future urban renewal area.

📷 Better connections to attractions

The Metro Tunnel will connect the north-west and south-east of Melbourne, making it easier to get public transport to Melbourne's parks, sports and entertainment venues, shopping centres and markets.

Better accessibility

The new Metro Tunnel stations will be accessible for people in wheelchairs or with mobility restrictions, with lifts, hearing loops, tactile ground indicators and Changing Places (accessible toilets).
