

What changes did we make as part of the Hallam North and Heatherton Road Upgrade?

We commenced construction of the Hallam North and Heatherton Road Upgrade in April 2021 and completed the project in December 2022.

In under two years we've:

 removed the roundabout at the Hallam North and Heatherton roads intersection and replaced it with traffic lights

- added two through lanes, two right turn lanes and a dedicated left turning lane in each direction
- added an extra lane in each direction between Heatherton Road and James Cook Drive
- installed traffic lights at Heatherton Village and Thomas Mitchell Drive
- built new shared walking and cycling paths
- installed safety barriers along the road.

How will the upgrade benefit the community and road users?

improve the connection to the freeway network



lower the risk and severity of crashes by adding safety barriers

Project legacy

A new seating area was built on Heatherton Road as part of the project's legacy. The area is home to two bench seats, two bike hoops and a dog friendly water fountain.

It also features retained historic fence posts, an interpretation panel describing the history of the local area and a second panel displaying Bunurong artwork created by students from Thomas Mitchell Primary School.

The purpose of the seating area is to strengthen the connection between people and their local community through the acknowledgement of the history and Bunurong culture in the area. Our aim is to leave a legacy not only for the project but for the people who reside in Endeavour Hills.

Supporting local business

We kept local businesses and the community front of mind, throughout the construction.

We explored various ways to support businesses impacted by our works, including the Spend and Win initiative.

This initiative encouraged the community to continue shopping at their local village, and contributed to positive relationships with local businesses.

During construction activities, we maintained access to Heatherton Village shops, Shell Coles Express, and United Petroleum.

Community engagement

Throughout the life of the project, we've worked with local schools to give back to the community and educate students about the project and career pathways in construction. Initiatives included:

- Road Safety Week & NAIDOC Week with Thomas Mitchell Primary School
- Careers in Construction presentations with Gleneagles Secondary College and Maranatha Christian School.
