

Maddox Road and Champion Road, Newport

Community consultation report

March 2025



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Project overview

The Victorian Government is making the Werribee Line level crossing free by 2030. As part of this commitment, we're removing the Maddox Road and Champion Road, Newport level crossings.

Following the opening of the Metro Tunnel later this year, the Werribee Line will be busier, with more train services planned in the future to meet increased passenger demand. This means the boom gates would be down for longer, making it harder to move around the local area.

That's why we're removing the Maddox Road, Newport level crossing by building passenger and freight rail bridges over the road.

We're closing the level crossing at Champion Road and building a new link road to keep drivers moving and create more reliable travel times.

The link road will extend Akuna Drive. connecting Champion Road to Maddox Road directly and will open before the Champion Road level crossing is closed in 2026.

Early works have started to deliver construction equipment, install temporary fencing and relocate utilities. Major construction will begin mid-year, and Newport will be boom gate free in 2026.

Why these level crossings need to go



Up to 48 trains pass through the level crossings during the morning peak



Boom gates are down for around 50 minutes



Over 10.000 vehicles travel through these crossings each day



Improved safety for drivers, bike riders and pedestrians.



Project designs and engagement to date



Community feedback has helped us better understand the needs of the local area. This feedback combined with safety regulations, our technical assessments and engineering requirements have shaped project designs, which were released in November 2024.

We've run three phases of community engagement:

- Phase one: June 2023-July 2023
- Phase two: April 2024-June 2024
- Phase three: November 2024—December 2024

This report focuses on phase three of our engagement: aspects of the design for the new pedestrian and cycling bridge over the rail line at Champion Road.

Pedestrian and cycling bridge resting points

In response to community feedback, the new pedestrian and cycling bridge will be designed to blend into the existing landscape. It will feature natural tones and materials. Native shrubs and grasses will be planted on each side of the bridge, as part of our landscaping in the area.

Wide enough to cater for large electric cargo bicycles, prams and mobility scooters, the bridge will connect Market Street to the north of the rail line and Akuna Drive to the south.

To maximise community safety, the bridge will have lights and mesh screens at the highest points over the rail line. The screens will be see-through to provide clear views.

People using the bridge from Market Street can choose either stairs or the ramp to cross the rail line. On the north side of the rail line, there'll be a viewing platform where locals can see the iconic Newport Power Station in front of the Melbourne City skyline.

Resting points will be located on each side of the bridge with seating and a railing, which will feature images reflecting the local area.

We asked locals to choose the themes for the images featured on the railing at the two resting points on the bridge.


What we've heard

We showed three sets of images depicting themes relevant to the Newport and Williamstown North community. We asked you select up to two sets of images for themes you would like to be considered for the new pedestrian and cycling bridge resting point design.

During our consultation between November and December 2024, we heard that locals value Newport's rich history, green spaces, proximity to the water and community spirit. Based on this feedback we've identified three key themes for the images to be featured on the resting point railings.

Ranked in order of preference with 1 being the most preferred.










Themes for the resting point railings


We asked you to select up to two themes to be considered for the resting point railings.




Using the new pedestrian and cycling bridge

How important is it to you to have safe walking and cycling connections as part of the project?




How often do you currently walk or cycle through the local area?

What else you told us

We also asked you what else you would like to tell us that may be relevant to the new pedestrian and cycling bridge over Champion Road. Here are the most frequently mentioned key themes from this feedback.

	Feedback	How we're delivering
Recreational elements	You told us you would like to see recreational features as part of the project design.	We are exploring opportunities to deliver recreational elements as part of the project via a community survey in early 2025.
		We'll report back to the community in the coming months.
Graffiti mitigation measures	You told us that graffiti of the bridge will be a concern.	As part of the bridge design, we will include graffiti deterrent measures.
		The bridge will have tensile mesh fencing on the ramps and there will be signage at select points on the bridge encouraging locals to report suspicious behaviours, graffiti and crime.
		The bridge will also have lights and mesh screens at the highest points over the rail line, providing passive surveillance.
Consider the impacts of residents living nearby	You told us about the importance of minimising impacts on residents living near the bridge and want us to minimise noise, privacy and amenity impacts	The bridge will be designed to blend into the existing landscape and feature natural tones and materials. We'll work closely with nearby residents to understand what we can do to mitigate impacts to them.

Safety	You told us about the importance of safety measures and lighting on the pedestrian and cycling bridge, especially for those who choose to use the bridge at night or when there is low visibility.	Safety is our number one priority when we develop designs.
		To maximise community safety, the bridge will have lights and mesh screens at the highest points over the rail line. The screens will be see-through to provide clear views.
Vegetation and landscaping	You told us that you value greenery in the local area.	We'll plant native shrubs and grasses on each side of the bridge.
